Executive – This committee has met bi-weekly or weekly since March. Many of the meetings have focused on the pandemic and how we continue to operate without interruption in a time that is so interrupted. They have taken advantage of new technology, made hard decisions, tried to be conscious and respectful of all groups feelings and needs and done their level best to serve the directors, district and club leaders.

I have never been prouder of what was produced because of this committee's effort.
