Greetings fellow Ruritans!

The year is halfway through. Are you meeting your goals for the year? It isn't too late to course correct. Pilots aim to land at the next airport when they take off at an airport. They have a set course. They must constantly correct their course during the flight due to airspeed or other weather conditions. If they don't, they will never arrive at their destination.

Our year of planning is the same. We start with a goal, but life tries to blow us off the course of meeting our goal. I recommend trying this exercise. Write on the top of your paper "Start...Stop...Continue," making three columns. In the "Start" column, write the new things that you think your club should start doing. For example, something that would help ensure your club and community's health, stability, and future. It could be an event, or it could be a behavior. Under the "Stop" column, write what you think is hurting the club. For example, the things that no longer benefit your club and community. Finally, in the "Continue" column, write about what works well for your club and community to continue doing.

This year, President Mike set a goal of growing by 3% and each district opening a club. I congratulate the 200 clubs that are making the growth goal happen. For many clubs, 3% is only 1 or 2 members. That is very attainable if you have an intentional plan and are working on that plan.

We currently have 26 clubs on the disbanded list. It is paramount that we start opening new clubs to replace these. Our Vision is to create thriving communities. The subliminal message is that we need to thrive ourselves. Please congratulate Dan River District on opening the Stuart Club. As I mentioned, our goal is to open one in each district. Once we start opening clubs, it will get easier. It will take practice, but once you get one, it will get easier.

I see a vibrant future for Ruritan. We are at a turning point in our organization where I see the start of an upward trend. We can never let up or get lazy. It will take all our oars in the water, pulling hard in the same direction to ensure our future.

Current Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference. Lt. Governors are required to attend this conference to be eligible for reimbursement of one half of their National Convention expenses.

Current District Governors and Zone Governors are not required to attend this conference but are highly recommended to attend.

President Elect Robin and the Leadership Committee are planning the training around the theme: "Ruritan Strong" There will be information that will benefit all Ruritans and how we can become better leaders.

The conference gives Ruritan leaders the opportunity to learn more about their responsibilities, share ideas, express concerns, and plan for the future of the organization.

It also provides an opportunity for leaders to learn about the responsibilities that go along with other leadership positions they may wish to seek and encourages them to move up in their leadership roles. The conference brings Ruritan leaders together to discuss concerns and plan for the future of the organization. Attendees will also learn the latest information about Ruritan programs and procedures. <u>A separate MMS training will be provided Saturday after the conference for those wanting to know more. Please bring your personal devices for a more hands-on approach.</u>

As stated earlier, Lt. Governors are expensed to this conference. Others may attend at their own expense and for a nominal registration fee. Special circumstances such as substitutions will be considered on a case-by-case basis by the Ruritan National President.

- 1. 2023 District Lt. Governors will be paid ½ of their expenses to the 2024 National Convention in Winston-Salem, NC, provided they complete the requirements below. (This will only apply if the current Lt. Governor becomes the District Governor in 2024.)
- 2. They attend the 2023 Summer Leadership Conference (unless excused in writing by the National President).



- 3. They attend the Governors' Training at the 2024 National Convention.
- 4. They attend substantially all meetings at the 2024 National Convention.
- 5. They assist the Ambassadors throughout the 2024 National Convention.
- 6. The district's form 990 has been filed with the IRS by the February 15 filing deadline for the fiscal year end of September 30.
- **All expense vouchers must be submitted within 90 days after the 2024 National Convention.

We want YOU to know about Project FOCUS!

Project FOCUS is the "Human Care" agency of Ruritan. Our mission is to show compassion to people suffering from medical emergencies, disasters, etc. We respond to needs by working with local Ruritan clubs to assist communities suffering from the effects of natural disasters such as floods, tornadoes, hurricanes, fires, and earthquakes. Our goal is to assist local Ruritan clubs by working with individuals who need our help.

To give you a complete picture of who Project FOCUS is and what Project FOCUS does, we have developed the following Q&A that you can use to share this new and exciting opportunity to assist our local communities during times of stress and need.

What is Project FOCUS? Project FOCUS is a 501(c)(3) program dedicated to funding our local communities in times of stress.

Who oversees Project FOCUS? The Ruritan National Board of Directors has a committee that reviews grant requests and commits dollars to where they are needed. They are also charged with developing ways to raise funds for the program.

Who are the current members of Project FOCUS, and how long do they serve? Project FOCUS committee members serve one-year terms as voted on by the current National Board of Directors. Our current board members are:

❖ Vice President: Roger Davis

Secretary: Donna Jo Poulton

Treasurer: Cassandra Flanagan

Director: Lynn Fillers

Ruritan National Support: Kory Wirt

Who can apply for assistance through Project FOCUS? Any club or district can apply for grant monies by completing and submitting a grant application form (found on the Ruritan. org web page under forms)

Where does the money come from? Funding for Project FOCUS comes from donations from individuals, clubs, districts, and businesses. Donations to FOCUS may potentially be tax deductible.

What is the application process? Here is an approximate timeline for applications submitted to Project FOCUS:

> A local club or district completes an application for assistance within their area.

- ➤ The National Office receives the application via email, the USPS (may take up to 1 week or longer depending on the mail service), or fax to the National Office. When submitting your application, please be sure to submit your approved club or district minutes indicating the approved motion for assistance. * If submitting by email- please include the Zone Governor, District Governor, and National Representative for your district.
- ➤ The National Office will acknowledge receipt of the grant request to the designated point of contact, the Zone Governor, the District Governor, and the National Representative assigned to that district. The distribution timeline will begin with this email.
- ➤ Application is shared with the current committee and reviewed for accuracy and scope of request- any requests that are incomplete or require additional information will be reviewed with the designated point of contact of the grant request or returned for clarification. (1 week)
- ➤ The current committee votes on completed grant requests, and a grant amount is assigned, or the application is returned to the designated point of contact with an explanation for the application being turned down. The Grant Response Notification will also be emailed to the Zone Governor, District Governor, and National Representative. (2 days)
- ➤ Grant amounts are distributed and sent to the designated point of contact. (2 days)
- ➤ The designated point of contact is responsible for completing a Grant Completion Form indicating how the grant was (or is being) used to meet the needs of the local community during their time of need (may take up to 1 month after the funds are distributed to the designated point of contact). If the distribution of funds exceeds the one-month timeline, a progress report shall be submitted and updated monthly until the distribution is complete.

How much money can be given for a grant application? The grant amount would be based on the need and the number of grants being considered at that time, subject to available funds within Project FOCUS not exceeding \$10,000 per event request.

When should we request a grant? The club and/or district should begin the grant process as soon as a need has been recognized and a reasonable estimate of a grant amount has been determined.

How can my club and club members, as well as our district, get involved? There are many ways to get involved with Project FOCUS:

- Follow us on social media- Ruritan National Project FOCUS.
- Encourage your club to make a planned annual gift to Project FOCUS.
- Have club members check with their employers to see if they offer matching gift programs.
- Be a boots-on-the-ground volunteer in your area- YOU ARE THE HANDS,
 FEET, and HEART of RURITAN!




Past National Director Foster Parrish Passes


