Larry Wayne Cassell, 76, of Jefferson, passed away peacefully surrounded by his wife and two daughters on Thursday, February 15, 2024. Larry was born on August 31, 1947, in Frederick, son of Vernon M. Sr. and Mildred Sensenbaugh Cassell.

Larry graduated from Middletown High School in 1965 and Salisbury State College in 1969, where he was voted Mr. SSC and served as Class president. He continued his education by earning a master's degree at Shippensburg University, PA, in 1972. After that, Larry continued his studies at the University of MD, completing all coursework except for the dissertation work for his doctorate.

Larry began his teaching career at Urbana Elementary School,

then moved to Myersville Elementary. He quickly became Assistant Principal at Thurmont Middle School. He then served as Principal at Wolfsville, Waverly, Walkersville Elementary, and Middletown Middle, ending his career at Ballenger Creek Elementary School. He retired in 2004 after 35 years. He mentored many new teachers and student teachers from Mt. Saint Mary's University during his many years. In 2003, Larry received the Washington Post Distinguished Educational Leadership Award.

Larry's community service involvement began in college when he served in Circle K, a branch of Kiwanis. After returning to Frederick County, he started his involvement in the Braddock Heights Optimist Club and earned an Outstanding Leadership award as club president.

Larry moved to the Springview neighborhood of Jefferson in 1977 and joined the Jefferson Ruritan Club shortly after. He also volunteered with several community fire stations. Larry received special permission to respond to emergency fire calls while working as a principal in the small community of Wolfsville. Once, the entire school student population watched as Mr. Cassell actively responded to an emergency call. Larry also had certification as an EMT.

Larry's Ruritan career began in 1978 at the Jefferson Ruritan Club. He held many offices in his local community club, including president and club secretary, for over 25 years. As a member of the Ruritan Club, Larry was also very active in the yearly Jefferson Carnival. With his continued commitment to community service, he held leadership positions as Governor of the Potomac District, comprising 45 clubs. He later became a National Ruritan Director from 2015 through 2017, and in 2018, Larry served as National President-Elect. The highlight of his Ruritan career was being elected National President in 2019. This involved many club visits throughout the eastern United States, where he and his wife, Nelda, enjoyed visiting and meeting fellow Ruritans.

His commitment was recognized via these notable awards: Tom Downing Fellow in 2001, Potomac District Governor Appreciation of Service Award in 2014, Outstanding National Director of 2016, and Ruritan Forever member in 2016.

He was a Trinity United Methodist Church member after being raised in the Centennial United Methodist Church in Frederick.

Nelda C. and Larry were married for 54 ½ years. During these many years, Larry and Nelda enjoyed skiing and camping trips. They also traveled to all 50 states and over 40 countries. Larry also enjoyed reading, golfing, visiting the beach, crabbing, and fishing in the Chesapeake Bay and Atlantic Ocean.

Larry was not only a dedicated husband but also a loving father of two daughters, Laura and Emily. He never missed a soccer game, swim meet, piano recital, or dance recital. Some of his proudest moments were the weddings of his daughters and the arrival of all four of his grandsons. Now better known as "PapPap," he most recently enjoyed attending his grandson's cross-county track events, ice hockey, baseball, soccer, and lacrosse games. He has genuinely been adored by all four of his grandsons.

He is survived by his three older brothers, Vernon M. (Ruth Ann), Harold (Sheila), and James (Beth); his wife, Nelda; daughter Laura, husband Randy; grandsons AJ and Zak; daughter Emily, husband JT; grandsons Brooks and Bodie; nieces and nephews; and many cousins. He was preceded in death by his parents, Vernon M. Sr. and Mildred Sensenbaugh Cassell, and beloved granddaughter, Allie.

Larry was the life of the party, always surrounded by friends and family. He very much enjoyed dancing, noting the Electric Slide as his favorite. 



# WHY RURITAN?

Have you ever experienced a "Godwink"—those moments when life aligns so remarkably that it feels like divine intervention? Let me share a real-life Godwink that unfolded in Woolwine, Virginia.

Back in 1956, a Ruritan Club was established in Woolwine, VA. Despite its disbandment in 2014, the spirit of community service remained alive. Inspired by President Robin's message about revisiting areas that once had a Ruritan Club, two members of the Ararat Ruritan Club took the initiative. They saw the potential of the Woolwine community and were able to gather a few individuals for an information meeting in August 2023. Little did they know this gathering at the Woolwine Volunteer Fire Department would ignite a spark that would soon blaze into something extraordinary.

In October 2023, the Woolwine Community Ruritan Club was chartered. Just weeks later, when a wildfire threatened Tuggles Gap, VA, the club wasted no time gathering support for the brave first responders and firefighters. Through their collective efforts, they provided invaluable aid for weeks on end, demonstrating the power of community service in times of crisis.

Then, tragedy struck in December. Two teens faced a harrowing accident, shaking the community to its core. Yet, once again, the Woolwine Community Ruritan Club rose to the occasion. Not content with merely offering support, they orchestrated a benefit event, drawing upon the strength of their community.

On February 24th, amidst music, food, and heartfelt camaraderie, the community came together for a remarkable event. With determination and generosity, they served 926 meals, had a silent auction, 50/50, a cut-a-thon, entertainment all day, held a live auction, and fundraised tirelessly. The result? A staggering \$45,900 was raised in just six hours, a testament to the community's resilience and spirit of giving.

What's truly remarkable is the timeline. The club was chartered mere months ago, in October 2023, and they haven't even paid their first quarter of national dues. Yet, with 44 members strong in a community of just 705 residents, they've already made a lifelong impact.

This isn't just about joining a club; it's about answering a call to serve. Those who took that leap of faith and embraced Ruritan did so for a purpose—to uplift their community in times of trial. They embody the spirit of service, showing us all what it means to be there for one another. If anyone ever asks what the value of a Ruritan Club is, we can tell them about February 24th in Woolwine, VA, and that magical day.

To the Woolwine Community Ruritan Club members, your dedication and compassion are a beacon of hope. You remind us why we're here: to stand by each other, uplift, and inspire. Thank you for your unwavering commitment to your community. You are true heroes in every sense of the word.

As a footnote, both teens are doing well. They have a long way to go, but with such community support and their faith, we all hope and pray that they will fully recover.

# **The Value of Ruritan Membership**

Benefits and values that individuals and clubs receive for their Ruritan membership

#### Income Tax Exemption

Each club affiliated with Ruritan National is automatically exempt from paying federal income tax on funds raised or donations received under a blanket exemption issued to Ruritan National. This exemption saves Ruritan Clubs thousands of dollars each year. Each dollar saved in taxes can be used for community service. Many clubs also benefit by exemption from state sales taxes. Without the Ruritan National affiliation, community clubs may have difficulty obtaining taxexempt status. Ruritan National also provides instructions and guidance for clubs that file information returns with the Internal Revenue Service. Ruritan National maintains and handles all filings concerning the blanket tax-exemption. Ruritan National can also help affiliated clubs that have problems related to the Internal Revenue Service.

#### **Ruritan Liability Insurance & Protection**

All clubs in good standing with Ruritan National are covered by general comprehensive legal liability insurance. Such insurance is critical to any group that deals with the public. For example, if a member of the public is injured at a Ruritan-sponsored event covered by this insurance, the club will be protected if a lawsuit arises from the incident. This liability insurance covers lawsuits arising from covered Ruritan sponsored activities, up to \$1 million per occurrence, \$2 million aggregate, plus a \$1 million umbrella.

#### **Ruritan Awards & Recognition Program**

Ruritan Clubs and members have the opportunity to earn recognition through national and district awards for outstanding community service. These awards frequently receive not only local but also regional and national publicity. Because Ruritan has a systematic recognition program, individuals and clubs performing outstanding service do not go unnoticed. This recognition adds credibility and distinction to a club's community service efforts.

#### **Ruritan Name and Reputation**

Well-known for community service, the Ruritan name is a valuable asset to clubs. Ruritan enjoys a fine reputation among service clubs, other civic organizations, government agencies, and communities in general. Serving America's communities since 1928, the Ruritan name automatically lends credibility to all club activities. Ruritan community service activities usually receive much more support and recognition than projects carried out by an ad hoc group of citizens or a local club that is not affiliated with Ruritan National.

#### **Ruritan National Foundation**

Each year the Ruritan National Foundation issues many educational grants to students who wish to further their education beyond high school. The Foundation offers a program that increases a Ruritan club's financial assistance to a student of the club's choice. Using this plan, a club can turn a \$300 scholarship into much more using the Build Your Dollar program. The Ruritan National Foundation also assists victims of local disasters through Operation We Care. Operation We Care provides much needed benefits to disaster victims after the immediate crisis has passed. Also, individuals or clubs can be honored in perpetuity by starting a "named fund" or "special permanent fund" through the Ruritan National Foundation. All donations to Ruritan National Foundation funds and Operation We Care are tax-deductible.

The leadership of Ruritan is chosen by Ruritan Club delegates to serve the needs and interests of Ruritan members and their communities. Ruritan National also provides educational material to help community leaders and conducts free seminars, workshops, conferences, and other training. Through Ruritan's volunteer program, trained leadership is available to assist clubs with any situation.
